On June 12, South St. Paul Public Schools held its 107th annual commencement at Ettinger Field, where friends and families of South St. Paul gathered and celebrated the accomplishments of 205 graduating students. As the Packer tradition, graduates marched around Ettinger Field and were greeted by an ensemble of student musicians as they entered the field.

The Class of 2014 is creating a new history for the next generation of Packers. There are members in this class who are on track to do something that no other graduate in the history of South St. Paul has ever been able to accomplish. Seven seniors are positioned to graduate from South St. Paul with three diplomas: a South St. Paul High School Diploma, an International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma, and an Associate in Arts Diploma from Inver Hills Community College.

The A.A. Degree candidates are Rachel Bakke, Hunter Blaeser, Cynthia Callais, Ben Holst, Michael Houle, Hannah Hoven and James Kolar. These students have completed all IB Diploma requirements by achieving a 4 or higher on all IB exams, and as many as six additional courses to meet the requirements of the A.A. Degree. They will receive two years of college credit that will be transferable to the college or university that they decide to attend.

Students are also given the option to take part in the IB Diploma program courses only. The program consists of pre-university curriculum, providing students with an international education that encourages an understanding and appreciation of other cultures and societies. At the end of the school year, South St. Paul Secondary recognizes students for their academic achieve-

ment within the IB program and for their participation in CAS, the component of the IB program which includes the students' achievements in Creativity, Action, and Service. Students who qualify for IB Honors are recognized at the end of their senior year. IB Certificate candidates received a silver medal to wear at the graduation ceremony, and IB Diploma candidates received a gold medal.

These students has shown that they are knowledgeable, hard-working, risk-takers, inquiring, principled, reflective, open-minded, caring, and confident Packers ready to take the challenges of their generation in order to make it the best generation ever.

Students, staff and faculty of SSP Secondary wrote messages and thank you notes to Officer Gravem before his retirement.



CLC STUDENTS INSPIRE LOCAL AUTHOR

So begins one of the books in the "Alternative" series by local author Patrick Jones.

Jones, a young adult literature author, has been working with students at the South St. Paul Community Learning Center (CLC) for over five years. His relationship with the CLC students began when counselor Mindy Haukedahl invited him to visit the school and share his passion for reading. His background working with at-risk youth has led him to write a series of books which focuses on students in alternative high schools.

When creating this new series, Jones spent time visiting with staff and students at the CLC in order to better understand how an alternative high school functions. After discussing his book ideas with the entire student body, a small group of students volunteered to meet with him weekly to share their school and life experiences. After these initial meetings, Jones wrote manuscripts, which he then shared with these students. The students edited, offered suggestions, and changed language to best reflect their thoughts and experiences.

The "Alternative" series is scheduled to be released summer, 2014 with more books to follow. Patrick Jones continues to work with students at the South St. Paul CLC and is currently creating another fictional series for struggling readers which will be set in South St. Paul and surrounding communities.

PAVING THE WAY TO KINDERGARTEN



The Latino Families Parenting Class celebrates the end of a year of learning. During the year, they learned about the importance of early education for children birth to five years of age. These early experiences directly impact how children develop learning skills, as well as social and emotional abilities.

In the Parenting class, families learned about the areas of Early Childhood Development, Parent-Child Relationships, Parent Development, Family Development, and Culture and Community. Parents learned to be more involved in their children's education to support their learning. Through these classes, both parents and children acquire good learning habits that will help them to become life-long learners.

The teachers emphasize the importance of their children being prepared for kindergarten so that they experience more academic success at the higher grades. This year, many of these children will start either preschool or kindergarten.

Diverse learners benefit the most from family educational classes. The goal is to help Latino parents build a better future for their children.

KAPOSIA CULTURE CLUB



The Kaposia Culture Club had a very busy year. Culture Club provides the opportunity for students to become more internationally-minded through interaction with interesting speakers. This year, they invited speakers from Russia, the Philippines, Kenya, India, and Australia. They also explored the traditions of Hannukah and Santa Claus around the world. To cap off the year, 18 students and advisors Chris Zanmiller and Tana Steenson went on a field trip to the Flamingo Restaurant in St. Paul.

The Flamingo Restaurant is owned by a woman from Ethiopia named Shegitu. Her business partner is a woman from the neighboring country of Eritrea. They should be enemies, but since meeting in the United States and given the fact that they are both refugees from their homelands, they have become best friends.

The Culture Club was treated to a delicious meal of meat platters containing beef, chicken, and lamb and vegetarian platters of cabbage, collard greens, yellow split peas, and lentils – all cooked in delicious spices native to east Africa. The students were delighted to eat with their fingers by using spongy bread called injera to scoop up the foods.

Shegitu spoke to the students about life in Ethiopia, especially her favorite holiday - the New Years. She also told of the trials her daughter faced when she first started school in the United States and about the school she is founding in the refugee camp in Ethiopia.

It was a very fun, educational experience for our students. They were able to experience a new culture and discover differences and similarities through food and conversation.

We are very grateful that the South St Paul Educational Foundation generously supported our field trip.

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE PROGRAM

The explosion of social media and technology has changed the way educators teach, how students learn, and the way teachers and students communicate. There is no question that emerging technology is having a positive impact in the classrooms. When new technologies are incorporated into everyday learning, students quickly become more interested in the material, and thus more likely to succeed.

In an effort to maximize learning opportunities for our students, South Saint Paul Schools has begun a 1:1 mobile device initiative. This means all students in grades 9-12 will have a mobile device issued to them for the 2014-15 school year. In addition, students in grades K-8 will have mobile device access.

Families wishing to partner with the District to increase mobile device capacity in our schools, have the opportunity to participate in the Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) Program. This program allows families to purchase devices that meet the recommended specifications from the vendor of their choice. While a specific device has not been mandated by South St. Paul Public Schools for the BYOD program, a device brought to school is recommended to meet minimum standards set by the District. A list of the recommended specifications is available on the District's website.
