WELCOME NEW SUPERINTENDENT, DR. BRIAN ZAMBRENO!

I am honored to be the new superintendent of South St. Paul Public Schools and I'm excited to partner with our amazing students, staff, families and community to drive SSPPS forward. During my first few weeks, it has been very clear to me the strong commitment our entire community has for our district's mission of igniting a passion in every learner to inquire, continuously improve, and engage in positively changing our world.

I currently live in St. Paul with my wife, Karina, who is a 6th grade science teacher. We have three wonderful children. Our family loves spending time traveling together as a family, going on family bike rides, and splashing in the lake when the weather is warm.

As Superintendent, I place a high value on education. I have degrees from the University of Minnesota, Hamline University, the University of St. Thomas, and St. Mary's University of Minnesota. My goal is to support all students toward post-secondary education of all types. We know each learner is unique, so we will prioritize supporting our students to be wellprepared for whatever direction they choose to take after graduating from SSPPS.

I started my career in Minneapolis Public Schools as a high school Special Education Resource Teacher. In that role, I supported students receiving services for several different disability designations. I was also a high school English as a Second Language teacher in Minneapolis and St. Paul Public Schools. In both districts I worked with new-to-country students from all across the globe, many of whom were refugees. In all of my teaching assignments I feel I learned as much from my students as I was ever able to teach them.

As an administrator, I was an assistant principal at the elementary and middle levels in St. Paul Public Schools and spent 8 years as principal of Richfield Middle School. Most recently I was an associate superintendent for Minneapolis Public Schools. In this role I had the privilege of supporting over 30 different schools with students from pre-kindergarten through graduation.

We are at a unique point in time for SSPPS and our broader community. We are transitioning leadership within the district and looking at what we all hope may finally be the end of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our staff and students have navigated yet another unique school year and have shown their resilience in the face of uncertainty, something we should all be proud of.



DISTRICT FINANCIAL NEWS

ONE TIME FUNDING HELPS SUPPORT STUDENTS AND FAMILIES AS RESULT OF COVID PANDEMIC

The spring of 2020 brought unprecedented changes to our society and educational system. On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act was signed into law bringing \$1.3 billion to school districts across Minnesota. These funds, known as ESSER funds, are one-time use to be spent over a three-year period to help districts safely reopen and sustain safe operations, and address the impact of the COVID pandemic on our students. South St. Paul Public Schools (SSPPS) used some of these funds over the past year on efforts to keep our schools open safely.

To help prioritize the remaining ESSER funds, the district completed a comprehensive engagement to solicit insight and input from students, families, staff, and the community on the impact of the COVID pandemic.

Based on the data collected the following common trends emerged:

- Need for enhanced mental/social/emotional health, social interaction/motivation
- · Need for individualized instruction/more adults per student
- Need for family support/parenting/engagement

As SSPPS works through the challenges of insufficient state and federal funding, declining student enrollment, and other increased costs, these one-time ESSER dollars will help us lessen those budget burdens and address the clearly articulated needs of our students, families and staff a result of the COVID pandemic.

Our ESSER spending priorities include:

- · Expanding mental/chemical and social/emotional health supports
- Maintaining low class sizes for more individualized instruction
- · Enhancing our school year with innovative learning opportunities

Our planning priorities include:

- Creating conditions for positive social interactions for our students and families
- · New engagement ideas and parenting support for families
- Collaboration with our community partners to better support all families

SSPPS REFUNDS BONDS SAVING TAXPAYERS DOLLARS

South St. Paul Public Schools issued more than \$12.6 million of refunding bonds that will reduce the amount of taxes paid by South St. Paul property owners. Refunding bonds are similar to refinancing a home mortgage. The district can take advantage of lower interest rates to reduce the amount of interest paid on the district's debt. It is not a savings to the school district, but rather a reduction in the annual tax levies. This means the savings are passed on to SSP property tax payers. The overall savings for residents will total \$1.8 million over the next seven years.

SSPPS SEES DECREASE IN FAILING GRADES WITH WHAT I NEED (WIN) WEDNESDAYS


At the start of the 2021-22 school year, South St. Paul Secondary staff decided they needed to think outside the box to help students academically. The past way of intervening when a student began to fall behind wasn't working; add in more than a year of learning model shifts, the amount of students failing one class or more was beginning to grow.

In the summer of 2021, the High School team worked on developing a plan that would:

- · Incentivize students to get good grades
- Help struggling learners in a timely fashion
- Allow students to have input into what they need to be successful

On What I Need Wednesday (WIN), students with a C-attend school. It is not a day off for students who have a C or higher in their classes, instead it gives them



What he says he didn't expect was the culture shift they have begun to create. "Students are beginning to think of a C- as the new F," Ochocki says, "I had a student say, 'look I'm even failing physics now' and when I walked by and looked over his shoulder I said, 'hey you have a C-' and he responded, "Might as well be an F." He also says they saw a decreasing number of students that HAD to come throughout the semester, but saw

attendance go up because students appreciated the extra help and support they received from teachers.

Feedback from students and families has been positive. Nate, a sophomore at SSP, says he likes the program because, "It gives me a chance to catch my breath and make sure my school work is on track." He goes on to say, "When I come into school, teachers are asking if I need help because they

SIXTH GRADERS VISIT BIZTOWN





Principal Ochocki says the school has been receiving emails and calls across the country. Ochocki says, "There are schools asking us what we did and how we did it. Now that we have the data to back it up and are

beginning to share it, people are asking more questions." WIN Wednesdays will continue to shift and evolve as more feedback and statistics are gathered.
